

INTRODUCTORY.

THE IOWA OFFICIAL REGISTER, as it is known to day, was first published by Hon. Frank D. Jackson, Secretary of State, in 1886. The material was compiled by C. S. Byrkit, then, as now, Deputy Secretary of State. From that time Mr. Byrkit has had special charge of the work, and each year important improvements have been made, and new features added, till the Official Register of 1892 is confidently presented to the State as a public document of almost inestimable value to all classes of our citizens who are at all interested in public matters. Prior to 1886 no attempt had been made in this line, further than to give a list of county and State officers. The vote on the head of the ticket was generally given by counties, and the population of each county indicated. In 1864, Hon. James Wright, then Secretary of State, printed this inatter on a large card, a few copies of which were used for general distribution.

This general plan was observed by Hon. Ed. Wright, Hon. J. A. T. Hull, and Hon. Frank D. Jackson, successive incumbents, till the change in 1886, when the present plan was adopted, and the name changed from. Towa Official and Statistical Table," to Iowa OFFICIAL REGISTER. The high esteem in which the Iowa OFFICIAL REGISTER is now held, may be judged from the fact that each successive year has witnessed an increase in the number of the edition published, while, at the same time, a vastly increasing number of applications are filed for the REGISTER, which the department has been unable to fill. This year an edition of seven thousand is published, but not half the demand will thus be met. All of the valuable features of former editions are retained, and several new features are added that will be highly appreciated. For instance, the 1890 census of the State is given by precincts, in advance of

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federal publication. It is the purpose of the department to still further serve the convenience of the public by added improvements to this valuable work, as they are from time to time suggested.

The State institutions, hereafter, are to receive more special attention, and arrangements are to be made for "photo engravings" of the main buildings of the various institutions, for use in the REGISTER of 1893. In fact, it is proposed to make the OFFICIAL REGISTER a perfect storehouse of information. As a non-partisan political hand-book, it is to be improved, as opportunity permits, putting in condensed form just such political facts as will be wanted by all parties. W. M. McFABLAND.

The Iowa Agricultural College was established in 1858. The legislature of that year appropriated \$10,000 to purchase a farm for the location of the college buildings and for experiments in agriculture.

In 1859 a farm of six hundred and forty acres, situated near Ames, Story county, was purchased for the use of the college. In 1862 Congress passed a bill granting to each State, public land to the amount of thirty thousand acres for each senator and representative to which the States were then entitled. The act provided that all the moneys derived from the sale of these lands should constitute a fund, the interest of which should be appropriated by each State to the endowment, support and maintenance of at least one college, where the leading object should be, without excluding other classical and scientific studies, and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts, in such manner as the legislatures of the States might provide, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions of life.

The General Assembly of Iowa in September, 1862, accepted the grant upon the conditions and under the restrictions contained in the act of Congress. Appropriations were made for the erection of suitable buildings and the college was opened for students in October, 1868.

In 1887 Congress passed a bill establishing Agricultural Experiment Stations in connection with the Agricultural Colleges and appropriated \$15,000 annually for the support of each.

In August, 1890, a bill for the more complete endowment and support of these colleges was approved by President Harrison. For this purpose the bill appropriated \$15,000 for the year ending June 30, 1890, and provided for an annual increase of the smount of each appropriation thereafter for ten years by an additional sum of \$1,000 over the preceding year, the annual amount to be paid thereafter to each State and Territory to be \$25,000, the same to be applied only to instruction in agriculture, the mechanic arts, the English language, and the various branches of mathematical, physical, natural and economic science, with special reference to their applications in the industries of life, and the facilities for such instruction.

The annual income of the college from all of the sources is now about \$78,000. This sum is devoted, as the law provides, to the support and maintenance of the college and to experimentation in agriculture.

Buildings: The National law provides that all buildings shall be erected and all repairs thereon made by the State. In accordance with its agreement with the National Government twelve commodious buildings have been erected by the State, at a total cost of about \$855,000, for the exclusive use of the departments of the college, besides the dwelling houses and the buildings for farm stock, machinery and work. The main college building is five stories high, including the basement, and is one hundred and fifty-eight feet long by one hundred and twelve feet through the wings.

About two hundred and fifty students can be accommodated in this building. The rooms are heated by steam and lighted by electricity. There are two boarding cottages, affording rooms for ninety-four students.

Morrill Hall is named in honor of the venerable United States Senator, Justin S. Morrill, the originator of "Agricultural Colleges." It is for chapel, capacity six hundred and fifty; library, capacity fifty thousand volumes; and museum, lecture rooms, and laboratories of the departments of zoology, entomology and geology.

The other buildings are a chemical and physical hall, an agricultural and botanical hall, a horticultural hall, a veterinary hospital, a sanitary hall, an engineering hall, work-shops, domestic economy hall, an office building, experiment station building, creamery, stables, sheep and swine houses, seed house, ten comfortable dwelling houses, etc., etc.

The College Grounds. The college domain includes about nine hundred acres; of this about one hundred and twenty acres are set apart for college grounds. Gravel drives with cement and gravel walks lead to all parts of the grounds and to the various buildings, and the true principles of landscape gardening have been so faithfully observed in the grading and in the location of buildings and drives as to make of the entire campus a large and beautiful park free of access to students and visitors.

Courses of Study. 1. The course in Agriculture embraces four years, and leads to the degree of Bachelor of Agriculture.

2. For the short courses in Agriculture and Dairying, certificates properly indicating the completion of certain studies will be given.

3. The course in Veterinary Science of three years leads to the degree of Veterinary Medicine.

4. The course in Mechanical Engineering of four years leads to the degree of Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering.

5. The course in Civil Engineering of four years leads to the degree of Bachelor of Civil Engineering.

6. The course in Electrical Engineering of four years leads to the degree of Bachelor of Science.

7. The course in science relating to the industries of four years leads to the degree of Bachelor of Science.

8. The course for ladies for four years leads to the degree of Bachelor of Letters.

Ladies may take any other course desired.

These courses of study afford the student an opportunity to obtain a pratical education and industrial training of a high order. The requirements for admission are such that a student can prepare himself in the country and village schools.

The corps of instructors who devote their entire time to college work number thirty or more. The departments are more thoroughly equipped with apparatus than any other institution in the State. Tuition is free. The total necessary expense of the student for the college year, including board, fires and lights, books and incidentals, does not exceed \$125.00, which the student, can in great part, make by teaching during the long winter vacation.

The attendance of students is now the largest of any year in the history of the institution. A spirit of industry, oneness and thrift pervades the entire college. Additional buildings, enlarged facilities, completer faculty, increased interest of students, earnest co-operation of Iowans, and as fine a class of young people as ever graced a college, combine to incite to noblest effort every graduate, patron and friend of the Iowa State Agricultural College.

The Iowa State Agricultural Society was organized in 1854, and in October of that year held its first fair and has never failed to hold annual exhibitions since its organization.

In 1885 large and commodious grounds were purchased at Des Moines and the exhibitions and office headquarters permanently located at the capital city. The Society has since that time not only added costly and permanent improvements to the grounds, rendering it one of the best in the country for the purposes intended, but in addition has entirely lifted the burden of debt which had accumulated during former years.

The Society pays something over \$25,000 annually in premiums, and its exhibits have attracted sixty thousand visitors in a single day.

The Society holds its annual meetings in January for report and election of officers, transaction of its general business and financial settlement.

The Society has about one hundred local societies in the State with a membership of forty-five thousand. These societies hold annual exhibitions in their several counties, at which premiums, amounting to a total of \$125.000 are paid. The exhibitions of these local societies show gross receipts of \$225.000 and a total indebedness of less than \$85,000.

An act for the establishment of a board of Dental Examiners, passed by the Nineteenth General Assembly, provides for the appointment by the Governor of a Board consisting of five practical dentists, each having five years' residence in Iowa: their appointment for a term of five years' service, each.

They shall hold meetings at least once a year, or oftener, if deemed necessary.

Dentists doing business in the State must register with this Board, and persons commencing the practice of dentistry, who have not a diploma from some reputable dental college, must be examined and receive license from the Board.

The act provides for a report to the Governor of the doings of the Board.

There are at date five hundred and eighty-two legally qualified practitioners registered by the Board.

This board is vested by act of the legislature, with the general supervision of the interests of the health and life of the citizens of the State, they having power to make such regulations as are deemed necessary for the preservation of the public health, and in all matters of quarantine they establish rules. The members of the Board are appointed by the Governor, subject to the approval of the executive council, one each year, and hold their office for a term of seven years.

The meetings of the beard are held the first Wednesdays in May and November, of each year, at the office of the Secretary, in the Capitol.

By an act of the Twenty-first General Assembly, to regulate the practice of medicine, a State Board of Medical Examiners was created, to consist of the physicians of the State Board of Health and its secretary. Under this act every person practicing medicine in the State of Iowa is required to procure a certificate from this Board. Four classes of certificates are issued: A. to graduates of legally recognized medical colleges; B, to those who practiced continuously five years in this State, three years of which in one locality; C, to those who have passed a satisfactory examination before the Board; D, to those who hold certificates granted by the Board of Examiners of other States in examination had before such Board.

The Board may refuse a certificate for incompetency.

The College for the Blind is not an asylum, but a well appointed school, equaling, in the amount of its apparatus, the thoroughness of its instruction, and the fullness of its curriculum, the best public schools in Iowa. It was established by the citizens of this State, in order that their blind children might eujoy educational advantages, similar if not superior to those afforded their more fortunate sighted children. During the thirty-eight years of its existence, it has received from the State treasury and paid out again, for improvements and repairs, clothing for pupils, support and current expenses, over \$870,000.

The school term begins on the first Wednesday in September and ends about the third week in June. It is desirable that the students enter at the first and remain until the close. They may, however, be admitted at any time, and they are at liberty to go home whenever their parents send for them.

The teaching will compare favorably with those in any locality. The principel branches taught are raised print, point system, arithmetic, spelling, geography, history, grammar, natural philosophy, algebra, rhetoric, physiology, zoology, chemistry, moral philosophy, civil government, political economy, geometry, English and American literature. The kindergarten is well supplied with the latest and best facilities. The exhibit of wire work, card drawing, paper folding and clay modeling, the work of little blind boys and girls—many of them under eight years of age—excites the surprise and admiration of all visitors.

The department of music is supplied with twenty-three planos, one pipe organ, three cabinet organs, and a sufficient number of violins, guitars, bass viols and brass instruments. Every student capable of receiving it is given a complete course in this branch.

In the industrial department, the girls are required to learn knitting, crocheting, fancy work, hand and machine sewing; the boys, netting, mattress making and cane seating. Those of either sex, who so desire, may learn carpet weaving and broom making.

These advantages are free to every person, either blind or of defective vision, and of suitable school age and capacity, in the State. All that the friends are expected to do, is to pay the traveling expenses and furnish clothing. If they are unable to clothe the pupil, the necessary clothing will be furnished here and the bill sent to the county from which the pupil comes.

The pupils are treated, free of charge, by superior oculists, who visit the college several times during the term.

The food is abundant and wholesome. The trustees prescribe the bill of fare for every meal

Many intelligent parents allow their little blind child to sit idle most of the day, and to contract all sorts of disgusting habits.

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After a short stay here those habits would be corrected, the child would eat properly at the table, and would run and jump on the play ground with as much vigor as its stronger sighted brother at home.

Two classes of parents are especially hard to reach. One is the p"well-to-do" man who will not send his child to an institution supported by the State. Such sentimentalism is absurd. Some of the best families in Iowa have children here. The other is the ignorant man who will not send, fearing that his child will be starved or abused. A secret or open visit to the college will dispell this foolish belief.

In different neighborhoods there may be old blind people who would be happy if they could find something to do. This institution can make them happy by sending them books and papers in raised print or point. Adults who can not learn the raised print, easily learn the point. Religious and secular literature, in either print, will be sent free to any blind person in Iowa, who will pay transportation charges. These books do not cost the State a penny.

It is to be hoped every one will send to the principal of this school the name and address of every blind man, woman or child within his knowledge.

Chapter 75, laws of the Eighteenth General Assembly, provides for the better regulation of the practice of pharmacy and sale of medicines and poisons. One of the provisions of said act was for the appointment by the Governor, with advice of the executive council, of three persons from among the most competent pharmacists in the State, who shall be known and styled Commissioners of Pharmacy. Members of the Board are appointed for a term of three years, one member each year. Every person who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, etc., for medical use, must first be examined by said Board and their names registered in a book kept by the Board for that purpose, showing also his residence, together with the date of issuin certificate.

Graduates in pharmacy from an incorporated college or school of pharmacy that requires a practical experience of not less than four years before granting a diploma, may be registered without examination, upon payment of two dollars.

Fee for examination and certificate, five dollars.

The Nineteenth General Assembly passed an act creating a State Educational Board of Examiners, and to encourage training in the science and art of teaching. The Board consists of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the President of the State University, the President of the State Normal School, and two persons, one of whom shall be a woman, appointed by the Executive Council for terms of four years, and are not eligible for re-appointment.

The Board holds annually at least two public examinations of teachers and a full record of their proceedings, as well as a complete register of all persons to whom certificates and diplomas are issued, is kept by the Board.

Persons holding a certificate from the Board are authorized, for a term of five years, to teach in any public school of the State.

Fee for State certificate, \$3, and for State diploma, \$5 fees when collected to be paid into the State Treasury. If, however, an appli. cant shall fail in the examination, one-half of the fee is returned-

In 1857 the society was organized under an act of the Sixth General Assembly, making an appropriation for its support and providing that it should be "in connection with and under the auspices of the State University; the object of the society shall be to collect, body, arrange and preserve in authentic form a library of books, pamblets, maps, charts, manuscripts, papers, paintings, statuary and other-materials illustrative of the history of Iowa; to rescue from oblivion the memory of its early pioneers; to obtain and preserve narratives of their exploits, perils and hardy adventures; to secure facts and statements relative to the history, genius, progress or docay of our Indian tribes; to exhibit faithfully the antiquities, and the past and present resources of the State; and to promote the study of history by lectures and diffuse and publish information relating to the description and history of Iowa."

The society has endeavored to carry out these objects and has accumulated a vast amount of material that would have been lost forever.

They have over seven hundred bound volumes of State newspapers, some reaching back before the organization of and from all parts of the State, which contains more local history than can be obtained in any other form. The *Historical Record*, a quarterly publication of the Society. is sent to all historical societies, and to the public libraries in the country, and to such newspapers in the State as send in exchange their publications, which are bound as soon as volumes are completed, and placed on the shelves.

The object of the society is the promotion and encouragement of horticulture and arborculture in Iowa, by the collection and dissemination of practical information regarding the cultivation of such fruits, flowers and trees as are best adapted to the soil and climate of the State.

The Society publishes lists of fruits, as well as trees for timber or ornament, best suited to growth in this State.

In order to facilitate the work the State is divided into twelve districts, each having its own director, and holding its own meetings, and it is the duty of the directors to report to the Secretary of the Society.

The Society has now established twenty experimental stations in different parts of the State, for the purpose of testing trees, shrubs, plants and fruits, before recommending them for cultivation.

The annual meetings of the Society will hereafter be held at their rooms in the capitol, on the third Tuesday of each year.

The Society publishes an annual report full of interesting and valuable papers.

This hospital was built in accordance with an act of the Twentieth General Assembly (1884). Clarinda, Page county, was selected as the location, and on July 4, 1885, the corner stone was laid for the building, which was opened for the reception of patients December 15, 1888, at which time there was received from other hospitals in the State two hundred and seventy-four male patients. The number of patients at beginning of past biennial period— July 1, 1889—was two hundred and forty-two; admitted during biennial period, ending July 1, 1891, three hundred and thirteen. During this period seventy-one were discharged; recovered sixtynine; improved, forty-five; died, sixty-one; total, two hundred and forty-six, leaving in the hospital at the latter date three hundred and nine patients.

The original plans for this hospital contemplated the accommodation of one thousand patients, but the buildings are still uncompleted and a number of patients have been returned to their counties for want of room in the hospital. A new wing added to the building for females is nearly completed.

An additional institution for the care of insane was established and permanently located at Independence, Buchanan County, by an act of the Twelfth General Assembly. The building, a beautiful and commodious structure, was pushed rapidly to completion and soon taxed to its utmost by receipt of patients.

At the beginning of the biennial period, ending July, 1889, there were three hundred and ninety six male patients, and three hundred and seventy female patients, making a total of seven hundred and sixty-six.

There were admitted during this period three hundred and twenty-eight men, and two hundred and eighty-nine women, a total of six hundred and seventeen patients. By adding the number at the outset to the number received, we get the whole number treated during the biennial period, which was thirteen hundred and eighty-three.

The average number of patients in the hospital was eight hundred for the first year, and eight hundred and twenty for the second year of the period.

During this time there were discharged five hundred and fifty patients, of whom two hundred and eleven recovered, one hundred and sixty one were improved, twenty-nine were unimproved and one hundred and forty-nine died.

The whole number of persons who have been treated in this hospital since it was opened on the first day of May, 1873, is four thousand and sixty-four, but on account of the re-admission of seven hundred and six of these persons one or more times, the hospital records state that five thousand and fourteen cases have been received into this hospital up to the end of this period.

The prevailing age of patients at the time of admission is between twenty and thirty, but as this State grows older, and as the confidence of the public in the hospital increases, the number of patients who are over seventy years of age becomes greater.

The Fifth General Assembly, by act approved January 24, 1855, established the above named institution, and appropriated for the purchase of grounds, \$4,425, also \$40,000 for the buildings. The institution received small amounts, from time to time, from the Saline land fund.

. The institution was formally opened March 6, 1861. The total number under care during the biennial period has been fourteen hundred and two.

Six hundred and forty-three patients have been admitted, three hundred and twelve men and three hundred and thirty-one women. Five hundred and eighty-six have been discharged during the biennial period, two hundred and seventy-five men and three hundred and eleven women. Of this number two hundred and twentyeight—one hundred and ten men and one hundred and eighteen women—recovered; one hundred and seven—fifty-eight men and forty nine women—were much improved; ninety-seven—forty-seven men and fifty women—were unimproved; one hundred and fiftyfour—sixty men and ninety-four women—died. The number of deaths has been larger than usual, and the death rate was largely increased by the epidemic of influenza or la grippe.

A number of improvements have been added to this hospital, prominent among which is the completion of the Industrial building, also of the completion and furnishing of the new kitchen, ice house, large chapel, and amusement hall, with stage and stage settings; also a number of minor, but much needed improvements.

During the blennial period the hospitals have been visited by the individual members once a month, and when occasion seemed to warrant it, by a majority of the committee. A thorough inspection was had of the wards, the living and sleeping apartments, beds, bedding, bath rooms, dining rooms, kitchens and wash rooms, and a due consideration given to the sanitary condition and the personal and general care and comfort of the patients. Other interests within the province of the committee also received proper attention and investigation.

Chapter 58, Acts of the Twenty-third General Assembly created and established the Industrial Home for Adult Blind residing in Iowa, and appropriated \$40,000 for the purchase of suitable grounds and buildings.

The object of the institution is to provide a working home and means for the blind to earn and provide their own subsistence. Under the provisions of this act the Governor appointed the above named Board of Commissioners for an official term of two years; they were vested with power to select a location and superintend the construction of the home.

Soon after the organization of the commission, Knoxville, Marion county, was selected as the place of location and suitable buildings, with a capacity for two hundred workers, were at once put under way and pressed to a conclusion, the building being completed and ready for the admission of eligible blind persons shortly after January 1, 1892.

Appropriation by the Twenty-fourth General Assembly, \$20,300.

The object of the Iowa Industrial School is made manifest by the character of the inmates of this institution.

The children who are committed to the care of this school are not the hardened, irredeemable criminals, but those who are young in years, eight to sixteen, and whose natures are still susceptible to the influence of kindness, moral training and proper discipline; but these beneficient influences could never accomplish the desired results amid the environments of prisons and penitentiaries.

Our State has wisely taken these facts into consideration, and, no less in self defense than in charity, has established these institutions as homes for our unfortunate youth, and has enjoined upon those who have the supervision of these schools the duty of having the boys and girls instructed in morality and such branches of useful knowledge as are adapted to their age and capacity and in some regular course of labor.

The lowa Institution for the Deaf is located half a mile from the city limits of Council Bluffs, and is free from the manytemptations to which the pupils would be exposed in a city. A healthier location would be hard to find. This institution is free toall too deaf or dumb to be educated in the common schools, whoare between the ages of nine and twenty-five, sound in mind and free from immoral habits and from contagious and offensive diseases. No charge for board nor tuition. It is a duty that parents owe to their children to give them an education, and if true of those with their faculties, still more is it true in the case of the deaf, whoneed to be instructed in order even to communicate with their fellow men, and to have some safeguard against the schemes of design_ ing persons. The education offered by the institution is free, and no parent ought to stand in the way of any mute child's obtaining what is his by right, through unwillingness to part with the child or desire for his labor.

The session of the school begins the second Wednesday in September and continues till the second Wednesday in June. *Pupils* should come promptly at the beginning and remain until the end of the session.

Pupils should be furnished by *their friends* with sufficient clothing, but legislative provision has been made to clothe those too poor to-supply themselves.

The Institution—The buildings of the institution are heated by steam and lighted with electricity; furnished with fire-plugs and hose on every floor, and the latest improved fire-escapes, reaching from the roof to the ground, are fixed on either end and the rear of the main building. A watchman is on duty all hours of the night and every precaution is taken to guard against fire, so that noanxiety need be felt on that score. A competent corps of instructors of long and successful experience is employed in every department. The older pupils are instructed in such trades as are taught in the institution. 'The time of the pupils is considered as belonging to the institution, and no compensation is expected by them or their friends. The trades taught are printing, shoemaking, carpentering, dressmaking, farming and gardening. drawing and painting, light household work, plain sewing and knitting are also taught. Shoemaking is taught by an instructor capable of doing all kinds of work in that line.

The Twenty-fourth General Assembly changed the name of this institution to "Iowa School for the Deaf."

INSTITUTION FOR FEEBLE MINDED-GLENWOOD.

This institution was established by the Sixteenth General Assembly and located at Glenwood, twenty miles south of Council Bluffs, on the C. B. &. Q. B. R. The purposes or objects of the institution are to provide special methods of training for that class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for children with normal faculties.

The object being to make each child as nearly self-supporting as practicable, and to approach as near as possible the movements or actions of normal people. It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly upon others to supply their simple wants. Although children in this department are classified as non-improvables and possess a low degree of mentality, facilities are provided for such training as may tend to correct improper habits and develop an interest in their own welfare. In the school department, lessons are imparted in the simple elements of instruction taught in common schools, as well as in industries suited to their capacities. Girls learn plain and fancy sewing and household work, while the boys are detailed to work on the farm or in the garden, in the shoeshop, broomshop or carpenter shop, and to assist in the various departments of the institution. The school year begins September 1st, and closes the last of June. While July and August are considered vacation months, about fourfifths of the children remain during the summer, occupying their time at such work as may be assigned them or in such recreations as may be available. Beautiful groves of timber surround the Institution, where much of their time is spent in suitable weather.

The law provides for the admission of children between the ages of five and eighteen. Children may be admitted at any time during the year. By request, a blank application for admission will be mailed to any address, which may be filled and signed by the parent, guardian or county board of supervisors, and returned to the superintendent, who, by direction of the board of trustees, passes upon the eligibility of the applicant and notifies the correspondent accordingly.

After admission they may be dismissed at the discretion of the board of trustees, or if there are good reasons why they should do so, they may remain permanently. Each child admitted should be provided with not less than three changes of clothing. If the applicant be of unfortunate or untidy habits an additional number of garments should be added to the list. After becoming an inmate of the institution clothing may be furnished by the superintendent and the bill sent to the parents or to the county auditor of the county from which the child came. The county commissioners may collect said bills if parents are able to pay them. By special request, bills may be sent direct to parents, who may remit to the institution. Statements are sent quarterly to counties and parents. The State bears all expenses except for clothing and transportation. Persons bringing children to the institution should avoid arriving on Saturday or Sunday. Our limited accommodations and exacting duties render long visits undesirable. By recent action of the Board we are not at liberty to entertain visitors over night. If money, cakes or sweetmeats are given at all, it should be to the matron, who will attend to their proper distribution.

A brief report of the physical and mental condition of inmates will be sent to relatives every month. Letters of special inquiry will be replied to at any time.

The institution is open to visitors every day except Saturdays and Sundays, more particularly from 2 to 4 o'clock P. M. One of our officers will accompany you through the apartments and explain the character and objects of the school.

I.-HISTORICAL.

The State Normal School was established by the Sixteenth General Assembly, for the special training of teachers for the common schools of the State. It was organized by the board of directors, June 7, 1876, and was opened for the reception of students, September 6, 1876. The first year (1876-1877), there were enrolled 155 students, and in the last year (1890-1891), there were enrolled 746.

II.-COURSES OF STUDY PROVIDED.

1. The scientific course of four years, containing all the subjects required by statute for State diplomas (life certificates). The degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred upon all that complete this course.

2. The didactic course of three years, containing all the branches required by statute for State certificates. The degree conferred for completing this course is Bachelor of Didactics.

8. The supplementary course for high school graduates. This course of study duly recognizes the work done by the public high schools, and adds just such work as is necessary to make a well qualified public school teacher. The completion of this course secures the degree of Bachelor of Science, or Bachelor of Didactics according to the grade of scholarship attained by the student.

4. The professional course for college graduates, giving them special opportunities to pursue studies in professional subjects. After one year's satisfactory study under the direction of the faculty, the degree of Bachelor of Science is received.

III.--CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION.

1. Age-At least sixteen years.

2. Scholarship-Fair knowledge of the common school branches.

3. Intention—Free instruction is granted by statute to all who declare their purpose of becoming students is to prepare to teach in the public schools of the State.

IV.-EXPENSES.

A contingent fee of not more than one dollar a month is required by statute. For convenience this is divided as follows, into term fees: Fall term, \$4; winter and spring term, each, \$8.

V.-THE PROVINCE OF THE SCHOOL.

This school is in no respect a duplicate of the other educational institutions of the State. It adheres strictly to the province assigned at its founding—that of preparing professional teachers for public schools. To attain this object, its courses of study are arranged and provided to meet the wants of all kinds of teachers found in country and city schools. Its faculty is selected with the same purpose in view, so that each one may be a specialist in his department, and all may be thoroughly familiar with the needs of the public school teacher. It sends out annually into the schools over three hundred teachers, who are fitted through its agency to do skillful professional work for the improvement and development of public education.

The "additional penitentiary" was commenced in 1872, and has been built mainly by convict labor. It is a fine structure, containing several large work shops, warden's house, dining room, kitchen, laundry, etc. The department for criminal insane is a special feature of this prison, and has been open, for reception of inmates, for about two and one-half years, and at present contains about thirty of that class of convicts.

The department for females is being pushed rapidly towards completion, the walls being finished at present up to the top of the second story.

Religious services are held regularly each Sabbath. The most illiterate only have access to the day school. Immediately after the dinner hour they are gathered into the chapel and taught spelling, reading, writing, and arithmetic, so that none have gone out during the past two years who could not read and write fairly well.

The prison contains a fine library of over three thousand three hundred volumes, well selected and suitable for all classes of readers.

The number of prisoners at lock-up July 1, 1889, was two hundred and twenty-four; received from all sources since that time, two hundred and sixty-nine; total, four hundred and ninety-three. Number discharged during the term, two hundred and twenty-two; in confinement July 1, 1891, two hundred and seventy-one. However, thirty of above convicts received were sent from Fort Madison, and ten from United States Northern District of Iowa.

The main building and warden's house of this prison were completed late in 1841.

Labor of the convicts is let out to contractors, who pay the State a stipulated sum for services rendered, the State furnishing shops and necessary supervision in preserving order. Huiskamp Bro., the Iowa Farming Tool Company and the Fort Madison Chair Company, being the present contractors.

The prison has an excellent day school under the direction of chaplain; also a fine library of seven thousand volumes; a number of newspapers and magazines are sent by their publishers to the prison.

Religious services are held regularly.

Number in confinement July 1, 1880, was 380; received from all sources during the biennial period, 445; total, 825. Discharged

during the period, 419, leaving the number present at lock-up July 1, 1891, at 406.

Appropriation by the Twenty-fourth General Assembly, \$16,950.

This institution was created by the Twenty-first General Assembly, and the main building was completed and opened with appropriate ceremony November 30, 1887. Since that time other improvements have from time to time been added, prominent among which is the new hospital, completed during the past biennial period. The hospital is one hundred and thirty-one feet in length. sixty feet wide, with two stories above the basement with spacious verandas and balconies. On the first floor are the surgeon's rooms, dispensary, reception room and matron's room and seven dormitories, and dining room, eighteen by forty-two feet, in the rear of which is a kitchen twenty by thirty feet. On the second floor there are eight wards and dormitories. The water closets and baths for each floor are in a tower eighteen by twenty-five feet. reached by a well ventilated vestibule. Great care was taken to secure good ventilation and to have the building erected upon the most approved plans for buildings of this character. It is a worthy monument of the gratitude of the State to those broken and feeble persons for whom it was erected.

There has been expended in the two years for improvements of grounds \$2,132.88; for support of the members, \$89,807.15, and for expense of commissioners, \$1,797.78. The cost of subsistence on the table from June 30, 1890, to June 30, 1891, was \$22,482; equals 16‡ cents per ration. The average number of members from June 30, 1890, to June 30, 1891, was three hundred and fifty-three. Since the last biennial report, June 30, 1889, there have been three hundred and forty-eight members admitted, making a total of seven hundred and forty-three since the home opened. Of that number one hundred and seventy-five have been discharged, sixty-nine have died, and fifty-three dropped from the rolls for being absent without leave, leaving four hundred and forty-six belonging to the institution.

If a member stays away sixty days after the expiration of his leave of absence, he is dropped from the rolls.

Of the one hundred and seventy-five who have been discharged during the four (4) years since the home was established one hundred and fifty-nine were honorably discharged upon their own request and sixteen were discharged for violation of rules, and of the sixteen so discharged eight were re-admitted upon promises to obey the rules. Many of those honorably discharged were men with families who have received pensions and prefer to return home.

SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME-DAVENPORT.

This institution was opened for the reception of children, July 13, 1864. The Eleventh General Assembly assumed control of the institution, providing a special fund for its maintenance, and otherwise providing for its management and permanent location at Davenport.

The trustees are elected by the General Assembly, in joint convention, at each regular session, and hold office for two years.

There is in connection with this institution, a school building, pleasant, commodious and well lighted, and it is the policy of the Board to have the course of instruction of the highest standard. A kindergarten is operated in connection for the very young pupils.

A library of over eight hundred volumes of well-selected juvenile literature is a source of pleasure and profitable entertainment to the children, as from necessity the pastimes and pleasures of the children are otherwise somewhat circumscribed; we feel that they should be well supplied with good books and reading matter of suitable character for their improvement and enjoyment.

It is the aim to provide the children with plenty of good, comfortable clothing, and to have them taught to take good care of the same. Their clothing is all manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food, and a reasonable amount of luxuries and when the funds of the different appropriations fail, the support fund has to make up the deficiency; which necessarily causes a reduction of the luxuries from the table, that are so much enjoyed by the children.

During this biennial period two hundred and fifty-one children have been received. Of these one hundred and one were girls, and one hundred and fifty were boys. 'Iwo hundred and one have been dismissed to friends who have become able to receive them, or to carefully selected homes where they will continue to receive such care and training as will fit them for meeting successfully the stern realities of life.

In July, 1840, congress passed an act providing for the setting apart of 45,928 acres within the Territory of Iowa, for the use and support of a university, whenever the Territory should become a By the adoption of the Constitution the people of the State State. accepted this grant of land and the policy was reaffirmed in the amended Constitution of 1857. At the first session of the General Assembly of the State, February 25, 1847, an act was passed locating and establishing the State University. By this act the public buildings in Iowa City were granted for the use of said University. The State, however, reserved the right to use such portion of the buildings as it needed until other quarters could be provided. Although the seat of government was removed to Des Moines in 1857, the United States District Court still retained the use of a portion of the old Capitol building, and it was not until 1860 that the University came into complete possession.

Up to 1860 the existence of the University was more formal than real. Regular meetings of the Board of Trustees were held, but owing to the inadequacy of the fund to sustain the institution, and the use by the State for other purposes of the premises designed for it, a very little of the real work expected of the University was accomplished.

The first session was opened in the Mechanics' Academy in Iowa City, in March, 1855. At that time there were established a Preparatory, a Normal and a Collegiate Department, but almost the entire work done was in the first two. After three years, namely, in June, 1858, all departments were closed with the exception of the Normal Department, and remained so until September, 1860, when the two that had been suspended were again put into operation. Since that time the University has continued its regular sessions without interruption.

The early catalogues of the University show that it was in its first few years practically an academy, and that although a collegiate department was established the instruction in that department was about on a par with that given at the present time in the high schools and academies of the State. For the first few years fivesixths or more of the students were enrolled in the Preparatory Department or were pursuing studies of like grade in the Normal. Even in the Collegiate Department the range of instruction and the facilities for work were extremely limited. But since those days the institution has grown and has become a University in fact as well as in name. The several professional departments have been added, thereby furnishing the youth of the State with ample opportunity for obtaining instruction in law, in medicine, in dentistry, and in pharmacy. These several departments were added to the University as follows:

The Law Department in 1868, the Medical Department in 1870, the Homeopathic Medical Department in 1877, the Dental Department in 1882, and the Pharmacy Department in 1885.

The government of the University is committed to the charge of a Board of Regents, consisting of the Governor of the State, and the Superintendent of Public Instruction, ex-officio, and one member from each Congressional District who are elected by the General Assembly to serve six years.

The Collegiate Department embraces four courses of study: Classical, Philosophical, Scientific and Engineering. Four years are required to graduate in either one of these courses, and ou completion the appropriate Bachelor's degree is granted. In the Law Department the course of study extends through two years, and on completion thereof the graduate is given the degree LL. B., and admitted to practice before the State and United States Courts.

The Medical Department and the Homeopathic Medical Department require the student to pursue his studies during three courses of six months each, and on completion of such course the degree M. D. is granted.

The Dental Department requires two years to complete the course and obtain the degree D. D. S. It is contemplated to require a full three years' course, at an early date.

The course in Pharmacy extends through two years and the degree Ph. G., is granted on its completion.

Summary of Enrollment-1390-1891, Collegiate Department, 366; Law Department, 161; Medical Department, 144; Homeopathic Medical Department, 44; Dental Department, 169; Pharmaceutical Department, 44. Total, 928, less 33 enrolled in two or more departments, leaves a total enrollment of 890; an increase in students from June, 1889, to June, 1891, of 269, or 43.8 per cent.

Number of instructors in all grades in 1889 was 54, number in 1891 was 74; an increase of 37 per cent.

It is now demonstrated that the World's Fair will be an immense display, and the Iowa Commission have already found it necessary to devote considerable attention to their work. The nations will present displays of their industry, civilization and culture. The States of the American Union will make vast exhibits of their productions. Each member of this commission desires that the lowa exhibit shall be of such fullness and excellence as to fitly honor the noble State they represent. Iowa has world wide fame for the fertility of its soil and agricultural excellencies. It is famous for the fineness of its fruits, the excellence of its dairy products, the intelligence of citizenship, the vastness and excellence of its herds, its educational achievements and the excellence of its moral and social life. Its commission feel that they but voice the sentiment of the people of this beautiful State, when they say that Iowa must make such an exhibit as shall do it fitting honor in the pending exhibition of the world's excellencies. Should Iowa fail to take a front position in the state exhibits, then Iowa will stand degraded in the world's presence. The Iowa Commission does not think that any citizen of Iowa will consent that this State shall suffer such debasement, and it appeals to the manhood and womanhood of Iowa to aid in making our State exhibit in the great World's Exposition so full and so excellent that their State shall have bonorable rank in that great convention of States and Nations.

To secure an exhibit that shall properly represent our beautiful and prosperous Iowa, requires industrious, well directed effort and ample means. A building of spacious dimensions and stately architecture is an indispensable necessity. The procuring, transporting, arranging and caring for such a display as will do us honor, must involve expense. It may reasonably be expected that from four hundred thousand to six hundred thousand of the people of Iowa will attend the great fair. They will need information and attention. A large sum should be offered in premiums for a live stock exhibit. Iowa must not only show the finest of her grains and fruits, but the very finest animals in her vast flocks and herds must be shown at the great fair. It must be evident to all that the Iowa Columbian Commission will be powerless to meet its great responsibilities unless ample means are placed at its disposal.

This commission, reposing full contidence in the intelligence, liberality and patriotism of their fellow citizens, are laying broad

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plans to secure such an exhibit of the education, art, industry, invention, manufacture, agricultural and horticultural productions and other resources and excellencies of its business, social and relig-The amount ious life, as shall win our queenly Iowa due praise. of money that our coming General Assembly should appropriate for an Iowa exhibit may be better estimated by considering what other States are appropriating for their exhibits. California, in the far away west and Pennsylvania, in the distant east, have each set apart \$800,000, and will add largely to their appropriations by private munificence. Missouri has appropriated \$150,000, and the citizens of St. Louis propose to supplement that appropriation by an addition of \$100.000. The new State of Washington, in the far northwest, has made an appropriation of \$100,000, while Illinois has appropriated \$800,000, placing \$80,000 in the hands of a committee of women for an exhibit of womanly work. The work of Iowa's noble womanhood must have place in an Iowa exhibit, and liberal means must be awarded the women of Iowa, that they make an honorable display of their achievements, in the beautiful, the useful and the honorable. The commission are laboring in complete harmony of purpose to honor Iowa by their work, and they desire in their effort the hearty and harmonious co-operation of the citizenship of the State.

The Iowa Columbian Commission, the first in the field secured by its committee, the first choice of ground for an Iowa building and exhibit. The site selected is pronounced the most inviting offered in the six hundred acres of beautiful parks selected for the great fair. The Iowa Commission desires to so add to its beauty by an exhibit of the excellencies of Iowa as to make it supremely attractive. Given a liberal appropriation by the coming General Assembly and the harmonious co-operation of the people of Iowa, the Commission is assured that the people of Iowa will not only derive unspeakable pleasure from the exhibition, but will also derive from it supreme advantages to their business interest and their social life. The wise improvement of this opportunity will be to Iowa a great educational, industrial and social blessing.

Appropriation by the Twenty-fourth General Assembly, \$125,000.

The Aldrich Collection.

Among the various objects which have found their way into our New Capitol, there is probably none which attracts more attention from intelligent visitors than this well known collection. In the beginning it was intended that it should consist only of autograph letters, manuscripts and portraits; but owing to the fact that generous people have felt inclined to present other objects to the State. it has been made to include many items for which, no doubt, other quarters will, in the near future, be provided. At the start it was the glft of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Aldrich, then living at Webster City, Hamilton county. They presented the collection to the State on the conditions that it should be kept by itself, in suitable cases, in the State Library, and that they should be permitted to make additions to it from time to time. This was in 1884. The donors have continued to add to their first gift until now. The legislature of 1890, by a unanimous vote, appropriated \$3,000 for "the collection and preservation of historic records and other valuable material relative to the history of lows," under direction of the trustees of the State Library. This work was assigned to Mr. Aldrich, in whose charge it still remains. The Collection on exhibition in the State Library comprises many hundreds of original letters, manuscripts and fine portraits. Among matters of special interest may be named a collection of letters and other written memoranda, by all the Presidents of the United States, and all the Governors of Iowa, with copies of the most authentic engraved portraits; original manuscripts of Queen Victoria, Robert Burns, Sir Walter Scott, Lord Tennyson, Thackeray, Dickens, Carlyle, Matthew Arnold, McCauley, Bancroft, Longfellow, Bryant, Lowell. Whittier, Dr. O. W. Holmes, Walt Whitman, Mrs. Stowe, Mrs. Julia Ward Howe, Margaret Fuller, the Carey sisters and hundreds of others. This Collection fills four large cases, each containing nearly two hundred drawers, and has long since outgrown its present quarters. Better accommodations should be provided in the near future for the growth and maintenance of this-perhaps the finest collection of its kind-in the United States. It is always open to the free inspection of the people, the cases having been planned by Mr. Aldrich for the purpose.

Dairy Commission.

The following statistics are from the report of the State Dairy Commissioner:

Total gross shipments of butter billed out of the State for the year ending September 30, 1691, 81,774,661 pounds.

Total shipment of butter billed out of the State for the year ending September 30, 1891, less 16 per cent tare, 68,690,715 pounds.

The best authorities estimate the home cousumption of butter to be fifty pounds per capita, or 100,000,000 pounds; to this add 68,690,715 and we have, as the total make of the State, 168,690,71 pounds.

Estimating 168,690,715 pounds of butter at 20 cents per pound gives \$38,738,143 as the value of the butter industry of lowa.

Number of creameries in the State, 705. Number of cheese factories in State, 111.

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Class "A" (18) includes all roads whose gross annual earnings per mile are \$4,000, or more, and are limited to a charge of three cents per mile for passenger fare.

Class "B" (5), all whose gross annual earnings per mile are \$3,000, or any sum in excess, but less than \$4,000, and are limited to three and one-half cents per mile for passenger fare.

Class "C" (18), all whose gross annual earnings per mile are less than \$3,000 and are limited to four cents per mile for transportation of passengers. These rates cover ordinary baggage, not exceeding one hundred pounds in weight with each passenger.

On the first Monday in March of each year, the executive council meet for the purpose of assessing railroad property, including right of way, bridges, culverts, rolling stock, depots, station grounds, shops, etc., as well as all other property, real and personal, exclusively used in the operation of such railwavs. In assessing a railway and its equipments the council must not only take into consideration the gross earnings per mile in the State, but also the proportion of the business which that part lying within the State bears to the business of the remainder of the line without the State, preparing tables thereof, from which certified copies are sent by the secretary of State to each county auditor in the State, showing the amount of main track of each railway in his county and the assessed value per mile of the same, as fixed by *pro rata* distribution per mile, of the assessed value of the whole property.

The State Library.

The Iowa State Library was organized by the appointment of a librarian in 1840, and the first report was made to the Fifth General Assembly, 1842–43, since which time it has steadily grown until now it comprises some forty thousand well selected volumes, about two-thirds of which number belong to the law and document department, and one-third to the miscellaneous. During the biennial period just ended the works in the latter department, comprising Iowa history, have been considerably increased, and much attention has been given towards completing the session and other law series, so that the library. to-day, is very complete and well appointed.

Rules Governing Requisitions.

The following rules concerning issuing of requisitions upon governors of other states and territories, for arrest and delivery of fugitives from justice, are furnished for the information and convenience of those interested.

When application is made for a requisition upon the Executive of any state or territory, such application must be accompanied:

1. By original sworn evidence that the accused has, since the commission of the offense with which he is charged, actually fied from the State of Iowa, giving the date of fleeing as near as may be and is a fugitive from the justice thereof. The affidavit must also show that the process is not sought for the purpose of collecting a debt or satisfying some private end, but solely in furtherance of public justice.

The state or territory upon which the requisition is desired should be designated and a suitable person named to act as agent in receiving and returning the fugitive. A sheriff or other sworn peace officer is preferred for such agent, and none other will be appointed unless he is recommended by a county attorney, by the sheriff or the board of supervisors of the county, by the authorities of the city or town in which the offense was committed, or by the complainant with a statement that the person so recommended has no private interest in the arrest of the fugitive. 2. By a duly attested copy of an indictment, or of an information made before a magistrate in the county in which the offense is alleged to have been committed.

The official character of a magistrate (other than a judge of a court of record) must be properly attested by the Clerk of Court of the county in which the complaint is made.

The application for a requisition should be made or endorsed by the county attorney for the county in which the offense charged was committed. The rules of practice adopted by the Inter-state Extradition Conference of 1887, and followed by the Executive authorities of many of the states, require that the application shall be so made.

Duplicate of all papers will be required—one set to accompany the requisition, the other to remain on file in his office.

IN CASE OF INDICTMENT.

When the application is based upon an indictment, the only papers required are the application, copy of indictment duly authenticated, and affidavit mentioned in the first paragraph—all in duplicate. The clerk of court must certify under his official seal, that each of the duplicate copies of the indictment accompanying the application is a true copy of the original on file in this office.

IN CASE OF INFORMATION.

Where the application is based on an information made before a magistrate, it must be accompanied by the affidavit in duplicate of some person baving knowledge, stating in detail the facts constituting the offense charged. When the crime charged is forgery, if the information is not sworn to by the person whose name is alleged to be forged, the affidavit of such person must be produced, or a satisfactory reason given why it cannot be so produced.

In some counties, the practice of making affidavits before notaries public, and filing them with justices of the peace as informations, prevails. The statutes of the United States, which govern in matters of extradition, provide that the affidavit in complaints shall be made before a magistrate. A notary public is not a magistrate.

The copies of the information which accompany the application must be certified by the justice of the peace before whom the information was made, to be true copies of the original instrument on file in his office. The clerk of the district court must attach toeach copy of the instrument, following the certificate of the justice of the peace, the usual certificate as to the election, qualification, etc., of that officer. All papers must be in duplicate.

MISCELLANEOUS.

1. In addition to the foregoing, some of the States insist on certain special requirements being complied with before surrendering a fugitive from another State, as follows:

a. The State of Massachusetts requires proof that the alleged fugitive has fied from the State, making the demand in order toavoid arrest.

b. The States of Ohio and Kansas require sworn evidence that the demand for the requisition "is made in good faith for the punishment of crime, and not for the purpose of collecting a debt or pecuniary mulct, or of removing the alleged fugitive to a foreign jurisdiction, with a view there to serve him with a civil process."

c. The State of Ohio requires that requisitions upon that State shall be accompanied with duplicates of papers. *Triplicate* papers. will therefore be necessary at this office when demand is to be made upon the Governor of that State.

2. A requisition will not be issued when there is a reason to believe the object sought is the collection of a debt, or the accomplishment of any other private end.

8. As the Governor is authorized to issue requisitions in cases of "treason or felony" only, none will be issued for persons charged only with misdemeanor.

4. When the fugitive, whose rendition is sought, is at large on bail, or for any other reason deemed proper by the Governor, the State will be at no expense on account of his return, or will limit the expense.

5. The Governor cannot make demand of foreign powers for the surrender of fugitives. Upon proper showing, however, he will make request for the same of the President of the United States. Instructions will be furnished any person desiring the issuance of such requisitions, upon application to this office.

6. When the fugitive has been returned, the agent may, when the State is liable therefor, file with the Governor a bill in accordance with instructions furnished him. Upon the approval thereof by the Governor and the majority of the members of the Executive Council, the Auditor of State will issue a warrant therefor. The State will be at no expense on account of returning a fugitive, if such fugitive is not indicted and tried by a jury, or pleads guilty to the charge preferred against him in the papers upon which the requisition was issued, unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that the want of trial was not due to any fault or neglect on the part of the person or persons interested in the prosecution.

Papers for requisition may be sent to the Governor's office by mail, and will receive as prompt attention as if brought by a messenger. The state will not pay express charges upon such papers. The foregoing instructions should be studied carefully, filed for reference and followed strictly, in order that mistakes, delays, and unnecessary expense may be avoided. A failure to follow them will necessitate the return of the papers.

Iowa Delegation in Fifty-Second Congress.

SENATORS.

WILLIAM B. ALLISON, of Dubuque, was born at Perry, Ohio, March 2, 1829; was educated at Western Reserve College, Ohio; studied law and practiced in Ohio until he removed to Iowa in 1857; served on the staff of the Governor of Iowa, and aided in organizing volunteers in the beginning of the war for the suppression of the rebellion; was elected a Representative in the Thirtyeighth, Thirty-ninth, Fortieth and Forty-first Congresses, and was elected to the United States Senate as a Republican, to succeed James Harlan, Republican; took his seat March 4, 1878, and was re-clected in 1878, 1884 and 1800. His term of service will expire March 3, 1807.

JAMES F. WILSON, of Fairfield, was born at Newark, Ohio, October 19, 1828; learned the harness maker's trade and worked at it for eight years, during which time he pursued his educational studies and acquired a thorough education; studied law, was admitted to the bar in 1851, and commenced the practice of his profession in his native town; removed to Iowa in 1853; was elected a member of the constitutional convention of Iowa in 1856; was a member of the State legislature of Iowa in 1857, 1859 and 1861, serving the last year as president of the Senate; was elected a Representative in Congress from Iowa, in 1861, for the unexpired term of General S. R. Curtis; was re-elected to the Thirty-eighth. Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Congresses, serving from December 2, 1861, to March 3, 1869; was a member of the Judiciary Committee of the House during the entire period of his service, and was its chairman during the last six years of his membership; was elected to the United States Senate as a Republican, to succeed James Wilson McDill, Republican, and took his seat December 4, 1883. and was re-elected in 1888. His term of service will expire March 3. 1895.

REPRESENTATIVES.

FIRST DISTRICT.

COUNTIES—Des Moines, Henry, Jefferson, Lee, Louisa, Van Buren and Washington.

JOHN J. SEERLEY, of Burlington, was born in Toulon, Illinois, March 13, 1853; graduated from the State University of Iowa, degree A. B., in 1875; was principal of the Iowa City High School in 1876; graduated from the Law Department of the State University of Iowa in 1877; is a lawyer by profession; was City Solicitor of Burlington for six years; was the candidate of the Democratic party for Congress in 1888; was elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Democrat, receiving 17,459 votes, against 16,388 votes for John H. Gear, Republican, and 150 votes for Isaac T. Gibson, Prohibitionist.

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SECOND DISTRICT.

COUNTIES .- Clinton, Iowa, Jackson, Johnson, Muscatine and Scott.

WALTER I. HAYES, of Clinton, was born in Marshall, Michigan, December 9, 1841; received a common school education; graduated from the Law Department, Michigan University in 1863; is a lawyer by profession; was City Attorney for Marshall, Michigan; was United States Commissioner for the eastern district of Michigan, and also of Iowa; was City Solicitor of Clinton, Iowa; was District Judge of the Seventh Judicial District of Iówa from August, 1875, till January 1, 1887; was twice the candidate of the Democratic party for Judge of the Supreme Court of the State; was elected to Fiftieth and Fifty-first Congresses, and re-elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Democrat, receiving 20,748 votes, against 11,738 votes for Bruce T. Seaman, Republican, and 24 votes for T. L. Tagget, Prohibitionist.

THIRD DISTRICT.

DAVID BREMNER HENDERSON, of Dubuque, was born at Old Deer, Scotland, March, 1840, was brought to Illinois in 1846, and to Iowa. in 1849; was educated in common schools and at the Upper Iowa University; studied law with Bissel & Shiras, of Dubuque, and was admitted in the fail of 1865; was reared on a farm until twenty-one years of age; enlisted in the Union army in September, 1861, as private in Company C, Twelfth regiment Iowa Infantry volunteers, and was elected and commissioned First Lieutenant of that company, serving with it until discharged, owing to the loss of his leg, February 16, 1863; in May, 1863, was appointed Commissioner of the Board of Enrollment of the Third District of Iowa, serving as such until June. 1864, when he re-entered the army a Colonel of the Forty-sixth regiment of Iowa Infantry Volunteers, and served therein until the close of his term of service; was Collector of Internal Revenue for the Third District of Iowa from November, 1865, until June, 1869, when he resigned and became a member of the law firm of Shiras. Van Duzee and Henderson; was Assistant United States District Attorney for the northern division of the District of Iowa, about two years, resigning in 1871; is now a member of the law firm of Henderson, Hurd, Daniels & Kiesel; was elected to the Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth, Fiftieth and Fifty-first Congresses, and re-elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Republican, receiving 19,689 votes, against 19,491 votes for Carl F. Couch, Democrat, and 10 votes for John Bowman, Prohibitionist.

FOURTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES - Allamakee, Cerro Gordo, Chickusaw, Clayton, Fayette. Floyd, Howard, Mitchell, Winneshiek and Worth.

WALT H. BUTLER. of West Union, was born in Springboro, Crawford county, Pennsylvania, his father being Colonel Hiram Butler, of that place; has lived in Iowa since 1875, and was elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Democrat, receiving 17,972 votes, against 16,028 votes for Joseph H. Sweney, Republican, and 101 votes for H. G. Parker, Prohibitionist.

FIFTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES – Benton, Cedar, Grundy, Jones, Linn, Marshall and Tama.

JOHN TAYLOR HAMILTON, of Cedar Rapids, was born October 16, 1843, on a farm near Geneseo, Henry county, Illinois; removed to Iowa in 1868; is not a graduate of any college; since 1868 has been engaged in the wholesale farm machinery business; is president of the Cedar Rapids Savings Bank, and a director in the Cedar Rapids Electric Light and Power Company; was mayor of Cedar Rapids; was member of the board of supervisors; was three times a member of the State legislature, and Speaker of the House; was elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Democrat, receiving 18,158 votes, against 17,860 votes for George R. Struble, Republican, 250 votes for Enoch Lewis, Farmers' Alliance, and 4 votes scattering.

SIXTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES—Davis, Jasper, Keokuk, Mahaska, Monroe, Poweshiek, and Wapello.

FREDERICK EDWARD WHITE, of Webster, was born in Prussia, Germany, in 1844; his father died when he was ten years old; came to America with his mother in 1857, and settled on a farm in Keokuk county, Iowa, where he has since remained; up to the breaking out of the war worked as a farm hand for other parties in the neighborhood; early in the winter of 1861 enlisted in the Eighth Iowa Infantry, and was rejected on account of not being quite eighteen years old; enlisted February, 1862, in the Thirteenth Iowa Infantry, and served until the close of the war; was mustered .out in August, 1865; returned home and bought land and engaged in farming and stock raising, which business he has followed since; never held a public office; was elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Democrat. receiving 17,092 votes, against 16,572 votes for John F. Lacy, Republican, 1,048 votes for Perry Engle, Union Labor, and 201 votes for Listin McMillin, Prohibitionist.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES-Dallas, Madison, Marion, Polk, Story, and Warren.

JOHN A. T. HULL, of Des Moines, Iowa, was born in Sabina, Clinton county, Ohio, May 1, 1841; removed with his parents to Iowa in 1849; was educated in public schools, Asbury University, Indiana, Iowa Wesleyan University, Mount Pleasant; was gradgated from the Cincinnati, Ohio, Law School in the spring of 1862; enlisted in the Twenty-third Iowa Infantry July, 1862; was first Lieutenant and Captain: was wounded in the charge on intrenchments at Black River, May 17, 1868; resigned October, 1868; was elected Secretary of the Iowa State Senate in 1872, and re elected in 1874, 1876, and 1878; was elected Secretary of State in 1878, and re-elected in 1880 and 1882; was elected Lieutenant-Governor in 1885 and re-elected in 1887; is engaged in farming and manufacturing; was elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Republican, receiving 16,821 votes, against 14,276 votes for H. C. Hargis, Democrat. Union Labor, and Alliance, and 97 votes for J. G. Little. Prohibitionist.

EIGHTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES-Adams, Appanoose, Clarke, Decalur, Fremont, Lucas, Page, Ringgold, Taylor, Union, and Wayne.

JAMES P. FLICE, of Bedford, was born in Bakerstown, Allegheny county, Pennsylvania, August 28, 1845; removed with his parents to Wapello county, Iowa, when seven years of age, and from there to Taylor county in 1857, where he has since resided; received a common school education; enlisted in the Fourth Iowa Infantry April 3, 1862, and served as a private soldier; studied law, and wasadmitted to the bar in 1870, and has been in active practice since; was a member of the Seventeenth General Assembly of Iowa, and served as District Attorney of the Third Judicial District of Iowa for six years; he was elected over Hon. A. R. Anderson, who washis captain in the army, to the Fifty-first Congress, and re-elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Republican, receiving 19,003 votes, against 18,887 votes for A. R. Anderson, Democrat, 331 votes for S. A. Gilley, Prohibitionist. 63 votes for I. N. Harris, Farmers^{*} Alliance.

NINTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES-Adair, Audubon. Cass, Guthrie, Harrison, Mills, Montgomery, Pottawattamie, and Shelby.

THOMAS BOWMAN, of Council Bluffs, was born at Wiscasset, Lincoln county, Maine, May 25, 1848; received a common English education at Oak Grove Seminary, at Vassalboro, Maine; removed to Council Bluffs in 1868, where he engaged in commercial business; was elected treasurer of Pottawattamie county in 1875 and re-elected in 1877 and 1879; was elected mayor of Council Bluffs in 1882; was appointed postmaster in 1885, and served until 1889, when he resigned; in 1883 he purchased a controlling ownership in the Council Bluffs *Globe*; was elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Democrat, receiving 18,605 votes, against 17,322 votes for Joseph R. Reed, Republican, 1,248 votes for Noah H. Bowman, Farmers' Alliance, and 55 votes for John Christy, Prohibitionist.

TENTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES-Boone, Calhoun, Carroll, Crawford, Emmet, Greene, Hamilton, Hancock, Humboldt, Kossuth, Palo Alto, Pocahontas, Webster and Winnebago.

JONATHAN P. DOLLIVER, of Fort Dodge, was born near Kingwood, Preston county, Virginia (now West Virginia), February 6, 1858; graduated in 1875 from the West Virginia University; was admitted to the bar in 1878; never held any political office until elected to the Fifty-first Congress; was re-elected to the Fiftysecond Congress as a Republican, receiving 18,395 votes, against 17,084 votes for I. L. Woods, Democrat, Union Labor, and Farmers' Alliance and 89 votes for Willis Werner, Prohibitionist, and 20 votes scattering.

ELEVENTH DISTRICT.

COUNTIES.—Buena Vista, Cherokee, Clay, Dickinson, Ida, Lyon, Monona, O'Brien, Osceola, Plymouth, Sac, Sioux, and Woodbury.

GEORGE D. PERKINS, of Sioux City, was born in Holly, Orleans county, New York, February 29, 1840; removed at an early age to the west; learned the printers' trade at Baraboo, Wisconsin; in connection with his brother started the *Gazette* at Cedar Fails in 1860; enlisted as private soldier Company B. Thirty-first Iowa, August 12, 1862, and was discharged from Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, January 12, 1863; removed to Sioux City in 1869, and has been editor of the Journal since; was a member of the Iowa Senate 1874-'76; was appointed United States Marsbal for Northern District of Iowa by President Arthur and removed by President Cleveland; was elected to the Fifty-second Congress as a Republican, receiving 15,972 votes, against 15,065 for John P. Allison, Democrat, 4,658 votes for A. J. Westfall, Independent (Farmers' Alliance), and 119 votes for D. J. Farnham, Prohibitionist.

In respect to sex, 48,442 penitentiary convicts are men and 1,791 are women. The percentage of women is somewhat less than it was ten years ago. It then slightly exceeded 4.5 per cent of the total number, but now it falls a trifle below 4 per cent.

In the year 1880 the population of the United States was 50,155,788. The number of convicts in the penitentiaries at that date was 30,659, or, if the leased prisoners are counted, 35,588. It is thus shown that the ratio of convicts to the general population was 709 in each million.

In 1890 the population of the United States was 62,622,250. The number of convicts in penitentiaries was 45,233. The ratio, therefore, was 722 to the million.

Third. Those in which the increase in the number of penitentiary convicts have been both absolute and relative. This groupincludes Arizona, 113; Arkansas, 268; Colorado, 841; Florida, 191; Idaho, 80; Indiana, 178; Kentucky, 433; Louisiana, 287; Massachusetts, 445; Minnesota, 184; Missouri, 421; Montana, 172; New Jersey, 510; New Mexico, 112; New York, 1,890; North Carolina, 206; North Dakota, 65; Ohio, 374; Oregon, 182; Pennsylvania, 524; South Carolina, 202; South Dakota, 97; Texas, 1,026; Utah, 127, and Wisconsin, 222. The only states which have prisons designed exclusively for women are Indiana, Massachusetts and New York.

The Republican party met in State Convention at Cedar Rapids, July 1, 1891, and nominated the above ticket and adopted the following

THE PLATFORM.

1. The Republican party of Iowa in convention assembled gives renewed expression of devotion to the principles of the National Republican party and declares the acceptance of those principles to be the bond of union with the Republican party of Iowa.

2. We commend the patriotic, wise and courageous administration of President Harrison.

3. We commend the Republican party in the last congress for its redemption of the pledges made the people as to revision of the tariff in the interest of home industry and of its work in behalf of the liberal provision for pensions for old soldiers in accordance with the pledges of the nation.

4. We approve the coinage act by which the great product of the silver mines of the United States is added to the currency of the people, and out of which experiment may come wise adjustment of financial questions, liberal toward western interests.

5. We commend most heartily the policy that has been inaugurated looking to reciprocal trade relations with other people of the American continent, and the administrative efforts now making for the enlargement of foreign markets for American beef and pork.

6. We assert that the Republican party stands of record in every State in this Union in favor of elections based upon the freedom of individual conscience, and that the Republican party may be trusted in Iowa, or in any State, to promote any plan of reform, Australian or other, calculated to extend and to further protect the purity of the ballot.

7. While inviting to our shores the worthy poor of all nations, we earnestly recommend laws that will protect our country and our people against an influx of the vicious and criminal classes of foreign nations and importation of laborers under contract, to compete with our own citizens, and earnestly approve the rigid enforcement of these laws, and of such further legislation as may be necessary.

8. We favor such legislation as will impose upon all classes of property, corporate or individual, equally the burdens of taxation.

9. We favor the passage of the Conger lard bill; State legislation tending to promote farmers' institutions and enlarging the powers of the Dairy Commissioners.

10. We regard the World's Columbian Exposition as an important event in the world's history, and we are in hearty sympathy with the effort to make it a success. In the friendly rivalry of states we should make a crditable exhibit of Iowa's products, and we favor a liberal appropriation by the next General Assembly for this purpose, that our prosperity and greatness may be fully exemplified.

11. We take pride in the record of this State, and recognize that its growth and power, its prosperity and good name are the fruits of its industrial people, and we believe in such policy, state and national, as will promote justice and a wider opportunity among these classes to their support in the future as in the past, and we pledge our most intelligent judgment and our most sincere endeavor.

12. We point to the record of the State under Republican administration for justification in the declaration that we favor economy and justice in the administration of public affairs. We point to that record also for justification of the statement that the party has kept faith with the people in the past, and upon that record we invite their continued support and confidence.

13. We have no apologies to offer to the people nor to the Democratic party for the Republican record in the conspicuous issue in the State campaign this year. In the interests of true temperance and under the laws of lowa enacted by the representatives of its sovereign people, the saloon was made an outlaw in this State. We charge that the outlaw has had the patronage, council and protection of the Democratic party; that the Democratic party, as it has won power, has nullified the law, defied the authority of the State, and the expressed will of the people, and that now an appeal is made to the electors of the whole State for approval of the lawless work We recognize that it is law against defiance of law, subordination against insubordination; the State of Iowa against the Democratic party. We recognize that the issue is between true temperance and free and indiscriminate traffic; we renew our pledge to the people and submit the issue to them. We recognize the fact that the control of the next legislature by the Democratic party means State wide license, and the control of the next legislature by the Republicans means continued opposition to the behests of the saloon power through the maintenance and enforcement of law.

14. We denounce the Democratic party of Iowa as insincere in its dealings with the saloon issue. We charge that party with service to the saloon and with the purpose to strengthen the saloon grasp upon the homes and politics of the State. We cite in proof of this its surrender this year the local option clause of the plank of 1889, under which last year the pretense of indorsement by the State was made and on which petition for the legislature was made. We charge that this abandonment of local option is the forerunner for further premeditated betrayal, and that trust in the Democratic party will end in the complete breaking down of all temperance legislation of the State, and the complete turning over of the State in every township thereof to the pollution and fester of the saloon against whatever protest of portions now free.

15. We protest against the re-election of Boies to the governorship of Iowa. We charge that in his unwise and ambitious zeal to cultivate the friendship and support of alleged "new allies in the northwest," and on that strength to commend himself to the favoring graces of Grover Cleveland, that he did most outrageously misrepresent the most industrious, frugal and prosperous people of Iowa in his efforts at a banquet speech in the city of New York, on the 23d of December last. We denounce as purposely misleading the alleged statistics with which the governor assumed to sustain the indictment against the State which had dignified his name.

16. We denounce the Ottumwa platform of this year as framed with the deliberate purpose to mislead and deceive, wherein sympathy is expressed where none is felt; wherein help is proposed where none will be rendered, wherein purposes are avowed which are not entertained. In the support of this indictment we point to the pretended friendship for the soldier and the arraigument at the same time of the Republican party for appropriations for the payment of pensions; to the free silver plank intended to deceive the supporters of free and unlimited coinage of silver; to the plank assuming to re-affirm the doctrine of control and regulation of railroads, a policy implanted upon this State under the administration of the last Republican governor, against the opposition, secret and open, of the Democratic party extending to an alliance with corporate power in the first election of Railroad Commissioner under the law of 1886.

17. We denounce the Democratic party for misrepresentation in its platform and before the people of the McKinley bill, charging that it seeks to mislead the people through the reiteration of untruths as to the effect of that bill, and in all ways to work upon the prejudices of the uninformed.

18. We arraign the Democratic party for opposition to ballot reform in the south, while yet making a pretense of ballot reform in Iowa, where the undisputed right to cast a free ballot and to have it honestly counted goes in every precinct of the State unchallenged.

19. We arraign the Democratic party as the enemy of the laborer, scheming to break down the defenses of protective laws, to block the wheels of home industry, and to degrade the masses of the people, a party controlled by the aristocratic and reactionary tendencies, the legacy of slavery.

20. The Republican party of Iowa appeals to the intelligence and to the integrity of the people of this State, and from all good citizens we invite support.

In Convention assembled at Ottumwa, June 24, 1891, the party nominated the above ticket and adopted the annexed platform.

PLATFORM.

1. As a signal illustration of the public good to be secured by letting the office seek the man we congratulate the people of Iowa upon the pure, able and fearless administration of our present distinguished chief executive, Horace Boies.

2. We again declare, that in the interest of true temperance we demand the passage of a carefully guarded license tax law, which shall provide for the issuance of licenses in towns, townships and municipal corporations, of the state by vote of the people of such corporation,* and which shall provide that for each license an annual tax of \$500 be paid into the county treasury, and such further tax as the town, township or municipal corporation shall prescribe. the proceeds thereof to go to the use of such municipalties.

3. We favor such changes in our laws as will insure, under stringent penalties, the full, fair and equal taxation of every species of property, after allowing exemptions as fixed by law, and we demand strict economy and bonesty in the expenditure of all public monies taken from the substance of the people under any form or guise of taxation.

4. We favor the Australian system of voting, to the end that we may have an honest ballot, uncontrolled by bribery or employers. We denounce the Republican party for the defeat of this salutary reform in the Twenty-third General Assembly, in defiance of a popular vote in its favor and in the face of its adoption by so many of our sister States, with the undeniable result of securing a pure and untrammelled ballot.

5. We re-affirm our adherance to the doctrine of control and regulation of railroads as now enacted into law, and we favor such changes as experience may show to be necessary to protect the people from evasions of law, from encroachments and extortions through imperfections of the law, and will establish just and equitable relations between the people and railway corporations in all travel and traffic over railway lines.

^{*}The words "of the state by a vote of the people of such corporation," were omitted in the first edition in the belief that they were not in the platform as read and adopted. The Democratic Central Committee claim otherwise hence they are inserted as desired.

6. We call for statutes which shall provide stringent safeguards in the organization of all corporations, protect the people from fraudulent and bubble concerns, and provide that when any such artificial creature of the law is found to be engaged in harmful practices, the law shall promptly put an end to its existence.

We denounce all trusts, pools and combines, and we favor such action, State and National, as will forfeit to the public all franchises and property made use of by corporations or others to form trusts in manufactures, trade or commerce, to the injury and spoilation of the people; and also to insure the punishment criminally of the individuals thus conspiring against the public weal.

7. The Democratic party declares that, in the division of the results derived from a union of capital and labor, labor does not receive its just proportions; and, on behalf of our laboring and producing masses, we renew that devotion to their interests and rights which has always been the fundamental doctrine and practice of the Democratic party. We favor the establishment by law of public free employment agencies in our cities, and of all other fair and lawful methods by which labor may secure employment and adequate compensation, undiminished by any device for the enrichment of the few at the expense of armies of toilers; and we condemn the practice of importing contract labor for work in mines or elsewhere.

8. We are in favor of the election of United States senators by a direct vote of the people, and, until an amendment to the National constitution can be secured, requiring their election by such direct vote, their nomination by State conventions. We hold in detestation the alarming corruptions which are so wide-spread in senatorial elections by State legislatures, and which have defeated the will of the people of the United States senate as now constituted.

9. We reiterate our demand of one year ago for the free coinage of silver and that it be made full legal tender for all debts, public and private, and denounce as unjust and dishonest the provisions of the law recently enacted allowing parties to stipulate against payment in silver and silver certificates, thus setting up one standard of value for the creditor and another for the debtor; one for the poor man and another for the rich man.

10. We again acknowledge the great debt of gratitude the Nation owes to the soldiers and sailors of the Union, and we declare. in favor of just, liberal and equitable pension laws for all invalid and dependent soldiers and sailors, their widows and orphans.

11. We denounce the McKinley bill, the motives of its authors and defenders, and the theory under which it is submitted for the approval of the American people. Such legislation increases the* cost of the necessaries of life, promotes dishonest manufactures, trusts and combines, creats sectional envy, despoils the many for the benefit of the few. threatens the country with an aristocracy based upon ill-gotten gain, and above all, corrupts the politics of the country so as to seriously endanger the perpetuity of popular government. We demand equal opportunities for every section of our country, and for every citizen; and we insist that every oppressive feature of the tariff be eliminated, to the end that our merchant marine may be restored to the sea, and the markets of the world open to the producing classes. The sugar bounty is not tariff. It is spoilation of the treasury for special classes and interests, which are no more entitled to be aided by the government than the farmers of lowa in raising hogs and corn, or the pioneer settlers of the frontiers in their hardships and sufferings as the van -guard of civilization.

12. We denounce the wasteful and lavish appropriations of the last Congress, which, in time of profound peace, expended an amount more than equal to one-third of the total public debt incurred in four years of unparalleled war for the preservation of the Union. This billion dollar Congress marks the final effort of desperate politicians to perpetuate themselves in power by subsidizing classes, communities, special interests, and privileged individuals from the public funds, which should be a sacred trust to be administered solely for the necessities of the government.

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12. While we concede the right of the relatives of our naturalized citizens to inherit lands, and the right of foreign investors and creditors to hold for a reasonable period lands acquired in the collection of debts; and while we welcome the actual settler as an owner, upon his filing a declaration of his intention to become a citizen, we are nevertheless unalterably opposed to the non-resident alien ownership of lands and of foreign syndicate ownership of our industries; and we also demand that all uncarned railroad land grants be reclaimed by the general government, and held for actual settlement.

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14. We tender to the Irish people our profound sympathy in their struggle for home rule, that safeguard of freedom, which the infamous Force bill attempted to take from the American people in congressional elections. We abhor the persecutions of Russia •toward the Jewish people, and we believe that all civilized nations should protest against such barbarism and inhumanity.

For the endorsement of these principles, and for the election of State officers and a Legislature in support of them, we appeal to the consciences, the intelligence, and the judgment of our fellow citizens, irrespective of their former party affiliations.

Resolved. That we are in hearty sympathy with the efforts being put forth to make a creditable exhibit of Iowa's resources at the World's Columbian Exposition, and we favor a liberal appropriation by the next General Assembly to the end that our prosperity and greatness may be fully exemplified at the great gathering of the nations of the world.

The first state convention of the People's party met at Des Moines, June 3, 1891, and put in nomination the ticket above named, and adopted the following

PLATFORM.

Resolved, By the People's Party of the State of Iowa, in convention assembled, that we view with alarm the continued encroachment of confederated monopolies and trusts on the rights of the people, and we are firmly convinced of the inability of the old parties to meet the issues which are forced upon us. A vicious system of class legislation protects a moneyed oligarchy most dangerous to the rights and liberties of the people, and is fast undermining the foundation of our civil government, which must rest upon the equality and intelligence of all. We hereby heartily ratify and confirm the movement inaugurated at the Cincinnati conference, May 19, 1891, and the wise and patriotic platform of principles there adopted.

We favor a judicious service pension law, and demand additional compensation equivalent to the disparity between the currency paid to our union soldiers and that of gold at the time of payment. In granting pensions there should be no discrimination on account of rank.

STATE ISSUES.

Concerning questions of local State concern, we declare:

1. That we condemn the action of our executive council for its refusal to increase the railroad assessment to an average equal to that of farm and other property, and affirm that said assessment, to be equitable and right, should at present be at least \$80,000,000, and that the Legislature should provide by stringent law for such assessment.

2. That we domand the establishment in our State of the Australian ballot system.

8. That we denounce the action of the Twenty-second and Twenty-third General Assemblies for defeating the Australian ballot bill; for incorporating the contract clause in the miners' screen bill; for the defeat of the two-cent fare bill; the uniform school book bill, and the bill for the taxation of mortgages, all of which measures we endorse and advocate.

We sympathize with the miners of Iowa in their struggle for the eight hour day, and pledge them our support for the repeal of the contract clause in the screen bill, and the abolition of the truck store system, and demand weekly pay for the miner.

We favor a uniform system of school books for the entire State, the books to be furnished by the State at cost to the pupils.

4. We censure the leaders of the Republican and Democratic parties for the constant effort to re-open the temperance question in this State, to the exclusion of the grave economic questions which now confront the people.

5. The creation of private corporations for pecuniary profit we believe to be contrary to moral law and in violation of sound public policy; and we therefore demand that our next Legislature shall provide for the investigation of our present system of private corporations with a view to their ultimate suppression as soon as it can be done with safety to business interests.

THE RESOLUTIONS.

The Prohibition party in the State of Iowa in convention assembled, acknowledging Almighty God as the source of all power in government, the holy scriptures be recognized as the basis of all civil law, do hereby declare:

1. That the manufacture, importation, exportation, transportation and sale of alcoholic beverages should be made public crimes and prohibited as such.

2. That such probibition can be secured only through amendments to the national and State constitutions and adequate laws secured and supported by the Prohibition party in Nation and State.

8. That any form of license or taxation of the liquor traffic is partnership therein and participation in its immorality; it is therefore the duty of every good citizen to withhold his support from the Republican, Democratic and so-called People's parties, which are committed to the continuance of the license iniquity.

4. That the internal revenue system should be immediately abolished.

5. We demand the retention of the present law prohibiting the traffic in intoxicating liquors as a beverage. To secure the execution of the law we favor, by the next legislature, the appointment of a commission with power to remove all peace and police officers within the State who will not enforce the law; the appointment of a State constabulary and also a sufficient appropriation of State funds to enable the law to be enforced in rebellious cities and counties.

6. We favor the submission by Congress of a federal constitutional amendment ordering that the right to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any State on account of sex; we favor an educational basis of qualification.

7. We demand laws prohibiting deals in futures upon any board of trade, chamber of commerce or public market.

8. We demand the passage of laws prohibiting aliens owning land within the territory of the United States; also corporate privileges; and that Congress take prompt action to devise a plan to obtain all lands now owned by aliens and foreign syndicates, and that all lands held by railroads and other corporations uncarned according to contracts, and in excess of actual use and needs, be reclaimed by the government and held for actual settlers only.

9. The right to make and issue money is sovereign power, residing with and to be maintained by the people for the common benefit. We believe in a triune currency consisting of gold, silver and paper money, floating at par in the market. We demand the abolition of national banks as banks of issue, and that the federal government issue all moneys. We favor the free coinage of gold and silver limited to the production of the United States, putting a dollars' worth of material and labor into each dollar that may hereafter be coined.

10. We demand the election of president, vice-president and United States senators by a direct vote of the people.

11. We favor the Australian ballot system.

12. We demand that our American laborers shall be protected from pauper and criminal labor of Europe, and that our immigration and naturalization laws be so arranged that our shores shall cease to be the dumping ground for the political and social dregs of foreign lands.

13. We express our appreciation of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union and all loyal workers therein.

14. We favor a gradual, just and equitable income tax for the collection of state and national revenue.

15. Arbitration should take the place of strikes and other injurious methods of settling labor disputes; employes should be protected from bodily injury or property while in the faithful performance of their duties; equal pay for equal work should be given both sexes.

16. It is the sense of this convention that all wage-workers should be paid in cash and allowed to purchase in the markets with perfect freedom.

APPORTIONMENT LAW OF 1890.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That after the third of March, eighteen hundred and ninety-three, the House of Representatives shall be composed of three hundred and fifty-six members, to be apportioned among the several states as follows :

SEC. 2. That whenever a new State is admitted to the Union the Representative or Representatives assigned to it shall be in addition to the number three hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 8. That in each State entitled under this apportionment the number to which such State may be entitled in the Fifty-third and each subsequent Congress shall be elected by districts composed of contiguous territory and containing as nearly as practicable an equal number of inhabitants. The said districts shall be equal to the number of the Representatives to which such State may be entitled in Congress, no one district electing more than one Representative.

SEC. 4. That in case of an increase in the number of Representatives which may be given to any State under this apportionment such additional Representative or Representatives shall be elected by the State at large, and the other Representatives by the districts now prescribed by law until the legislature of such State, in the manner herein prescribed, shall redistrict such State; and if there be no increase in the number of Representatives from a State, the Representatives thereof shall be elected from the districts now prescribed by law until such State be redistricted as herein prescribed by the legislature of said State.

SEC. 5. That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.
